# Syllabus: Residential Landscape Design (On-line course) ORH4932 (27537) Fall 2025

Instructor: Gail Hansen, PhD

Office hours: Thursdays (zoom class session) or by request for an alternate day or time

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### **Course Description**

#### LDE 3410C- Credits 3, Prerequisite: none

Basics of residential landscape design including the art and science of design and developing landscape plans. Emphasizes the use of ornamental plants and outdoor spaces for functional and aesthetic improvement of home environments.

#### **Course Structure**

Zoom meetings on Thursdays, 4pm to 5pm (time may be revised by consensus after first class meeting) All reading lessons, exercise worksheets, handouts, and project instructions will be available in canvas.

### **Course Format**

Four areas of instruction include:

- **Design Concepts-** Art and science of design, Plant characteristics, Plant selection, Form and pattern in hardscape, Composition, Color theory, Inspiration, Elements and principles, Design trends, Styles and themes
- **Development Concepts-** Design process, Inventory and analysis, User Interview, Plant palettes, Conceptual plans, Composition with plants and drawing a planting plan
- Cultural and social Concepts- Landscape preferences and perceptions, Novel landscapes
- Graphics and Presentation- Graphic Symbols, Rendering, Plan Labels, Plant Materials Schedule

### Goals and Objectives

**Course Goal**: To develop a functional and aesthetic landscape for a residence using the design process and elements and principles of design.

Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes: by the end of the semester students should be able to:

- Describe plant characteristics and list functional use of plants
- Describe basic concepts of color theory and the aesthetic use of plant material
- Identify appropriate plant materials for residential design in Florida
- Understand the concepts of landscape preferences and perceptions
- Describe design themes and styles and identify examples in landscape images
- Use a site inventory and analysis to develop a design
- Identify and describe the characteristics of a design theme/style and apply to design project
- Show evidence of design understanding by using form and spatial composition
- Develop a planting plan based on the Florida-Friendly principle of right plant-right place
- Develop graphic plans for planting designs, including symbols, labels, and a plant schedule

#### **Evaluation**

Students are evaluated on exercise worksheets and design projects:

- **Readings and Exercise worksheets-** students are expected to read each of the Lessons and complete the worksheet, plus the tutorial assignment. The worksheet and assignment will be uploaded in canvas each week
- Landscape Plans Site #1 and Site #2- students will draw a fully rendered landscape plan and materials schedule (spreadsheet). The site base map, photos of the site, a description of the project site and design requirements will be provided in canvas. Students may be allowed to choose their own site for Landscape Plan #2 if they can provide all the required documents.

The primary reason for deduction of points is incomplete assignments- make sure that all assignments are complete before submitting.

# **Grading Policy**

Students are responsible for keeping track of their scores on assignments and monitoring their progress. Concerns and/or questions about scores should be discussed with instructor immediately, **do not wait until the end of the semester to discuss grade questions.** No extra-credit assignments will be given to rectify low or missing grades. Required textbook: None. All reading materials will be supplied. Students are required to purchase a few drawing tools for creating the landscape plans. A detailed materials list is included on the semester schedule. Materials include pencils, circle templates, an engineer's scale and paper for making copies of base maps. Students will need a printer that prints 8.5 x 11" sheets and has a scanning function to scan and save completed landscape plans as pdf files to be uploaded.

#### **Student Fees**

Lab fees are assessed for this course. Fees are used to make copies of base maps for uploading in canvas.
